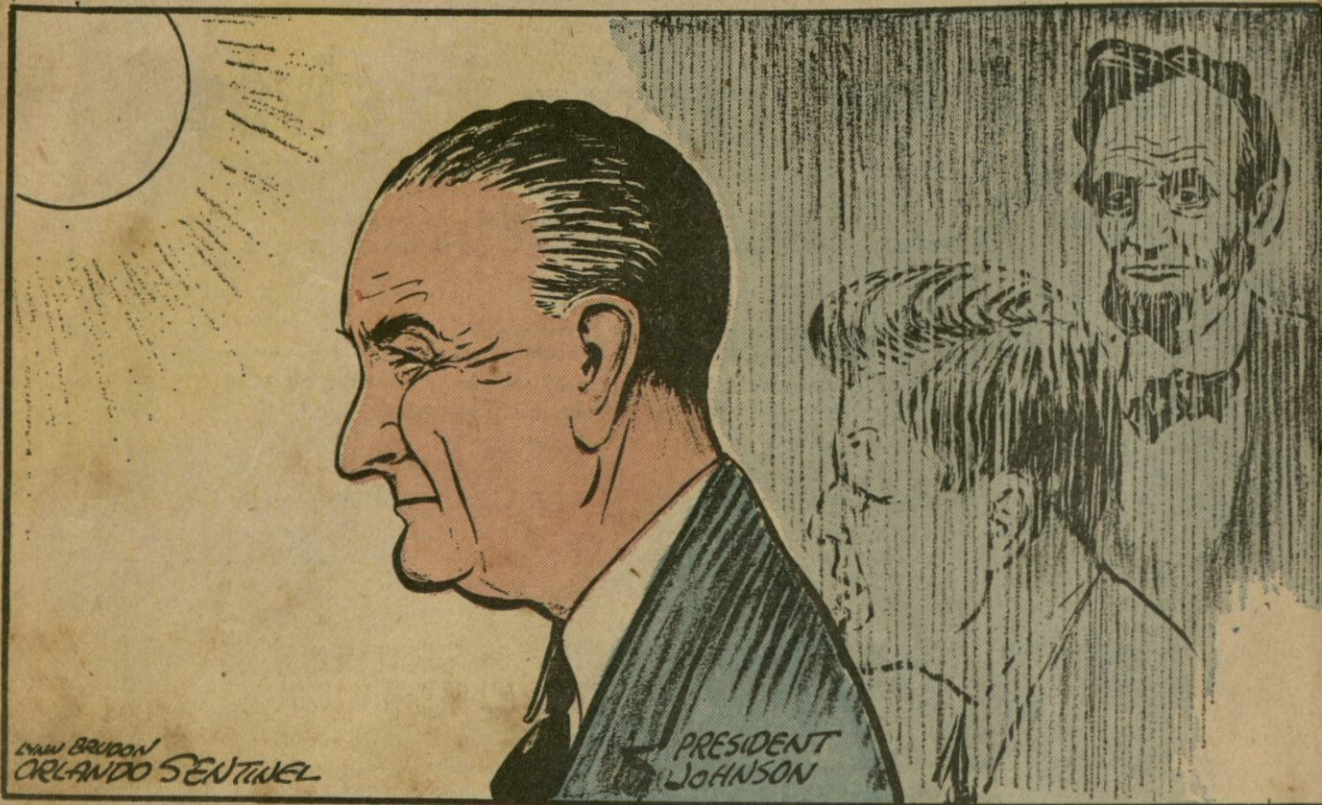

Mrs. Kennedy's Composure Shaken

Jackie Cries At Grave

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mrs. John F. Kennedy could not hold back the tears yesterday when she left her husband's grave in Arlington

National Cemetery after lighting an eternal flame to burn there in his memory.

The former First Lady's emotions finally became manifest at this last parting from the slain President. She had managed until then to retain a grief-stricken composure throughout the long public ceremonial of the past three days.

She had dressed in black with a long black veil over her face for the funeral and burial services.

AND SHE HAD walked slowly behind the horse-drawn caisson that carried her husband's body from the White House to St. Matthews Cathedral for the funeral mass.

It was believed this was the first time a president's widow had walked in his funeral procession. White House sources said Mrs. Kennedy, who took part in the detailed planning of the ceremonies, had wanted the funeral for her slain husband to be "as distinguished a tribute as possible" and that it be modeled after that of Abraham Lincoln, a martyred president assassinated almost 100 years ago.

FBI To Give Slaying Report

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI is preparing a detailed report of the assassination of President Kennedy — and all the details will be made public, the White House announced last night.

President Johnson directed the Justice Department and the FBI "to conduct a prompt and thorough investigation of all the circumstances surrounding the brutal assassination of President Kennedy and the murder of his alleged assassin."

THE WHITE HOUSE said Johnson has "directed all federal agencies to co-operate, and the people of the nation may be sure that all of the facts will be made public."

The announcement came after Rep. Hale Boggs of Louisiana, assistant Democratic House leader, suggested a high level congressional investigation of Kennedy's assassination be carried out. He said this should be done since the facts cannot be put into the record by a trial of the man accused of firing the fatal shots.

Brave Widow Puts Torch To Eternal Flame

WASHINGTON (AP) — The peace of eternity came in an Arlington grave yesterday to John F. Kennedy, whose quest for enduring peace in a dangerous world was cut short by an assassin's bullet. And over his resting place will burn an eternal flame.

In death as in life, world statesmen, men of power and renown from half the nations of the world honored the fallen President. They had come here in unprecedented numbers and in mourning.

THE NEW President, Lyndon B. Johnson, and former Presidents Dwight D. Eisenhower and Harry S. Truman mourned the passing of the man who had served in the same high office they have held. But it was Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, sustained by some unknown strength through three racking days of grief, who touched a torch to the eternal light on the grave of her husband.

But at last this lady in black, with the long veil disguising some of her sorrow and weariness, stumbled just a bit as she left the site of the burial of the 35th President on the gentle slope of Arlington National Cemetery.

The services at the graveside were those of the Roman Catholic Church, for the first Roman Catholic to reach the White House.

Never in memory has this tortured city grieved more than in the last four days since the death of the President.

Texas To Conduct Court Of Inquiry

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Texas Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr announced at a news conference that he will conduct a court of inquiry into the deaths of President Kennedy and his accused assassin Lee Harvey Oswald.

A court of inquiry is a Texas legal device used to get information officially before the public. It was last used in connection with the financial manipulations of Billie Sol Estes.

Mrs. Kennedy Gives Americans 'Majesty'

LONDON (AP) — "Jacqueline Kennedy has given the American people from this day on one thing they have always lacked—majesty."

This was the introduction of a Washington story in the London Evening Standard yesterday, under the black headline: "Magic Majesty of Mrs. Kennedy."

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The United Nations, still shocked by the assassination of President Kennedy, will hold a general assembly memorial service for the slain leader today at 3 p.m.

This was supposed to be the day of The Party. The cake with three candles to blow out, the friends singing boisterous "happy birthdays," the gifts.

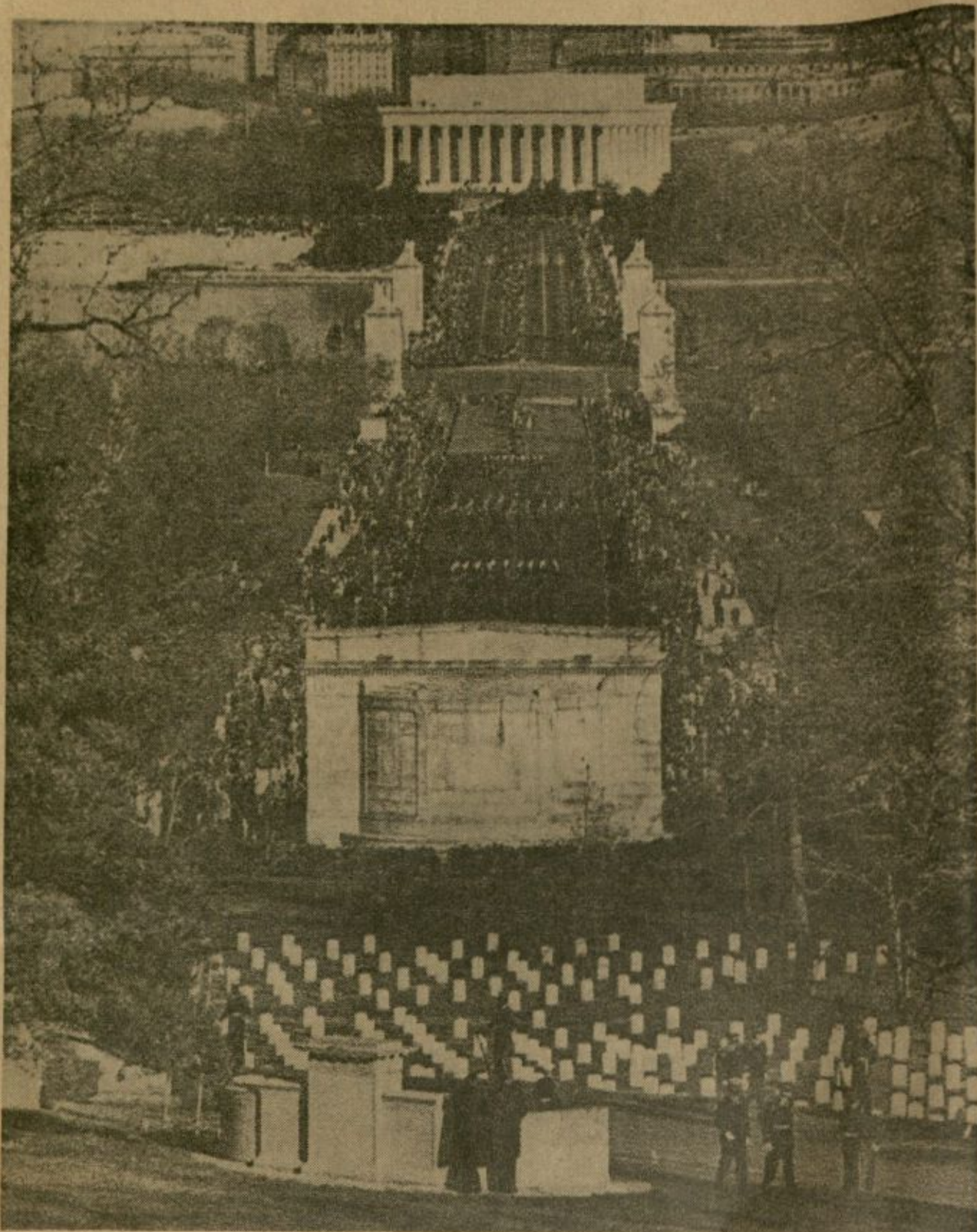
He did get a letter, as did his sister Caroline, from Lyndon Johnson, the man they call president now. No one, outside the White

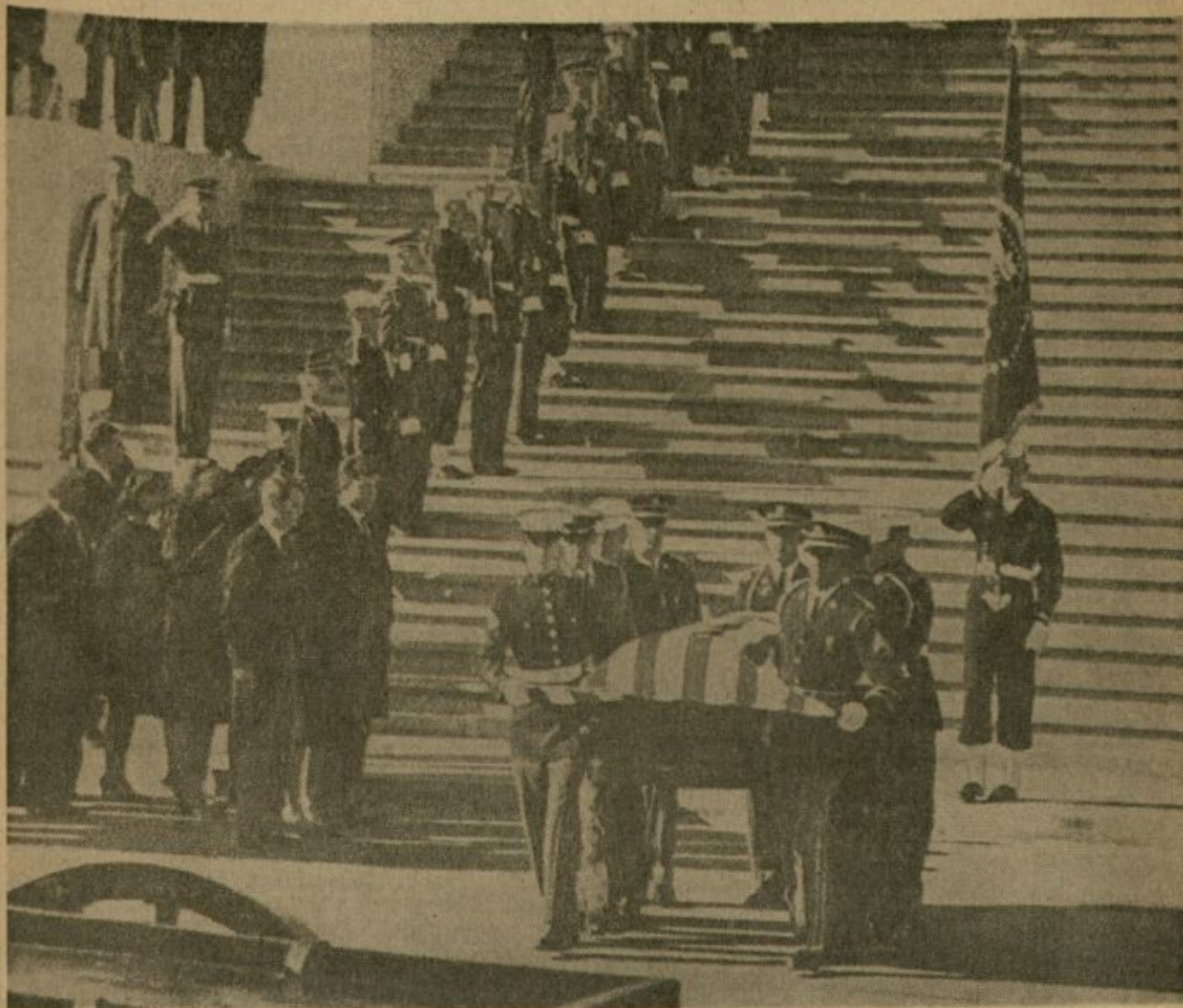
